
Gaining Insights:





Thank you for being a part of our wonderful Brooklyn Amity School community. We are already looking forward to the next Character Day and the opportunity to celebrate with all of you!




POEM: FLYING NON-STOP



**ESSAY:
RECONSTRUCTION PLAN

Reconstruction was a plan after the Civil War between 1863 and 1877 by Abraham Lincoln. The original intentions of the reconstruction were very positive and didn't think the South needed to be punished that much. But the Radicals were mad and not very tolerant as others and wanted total punishment of the South, were extremists who believed in the total punishment of the South. They believed they shouldn't be readmitted into the union until they abolished their slavery among other conditions. The radicals believed that the South had to pay for what they had done and face their punishments. Because of this disagreement, both sides shifted power. Both sides had very different ideas from each other and believed in different principles. One side was more lenient and the other side was more aggressive towards reconstruction.

Because of this shift in power, it was a political success but it also was a social success. The shift in power was mainly caused by the immense amount of freed blacks and some white confederates losing their voting rights. This gave more political power to the blacks who were more lenient towards the union as they fought for their freedom which gave more power to them.

Reconstruction was a process that would add South back into the union and make them a part of it and didn't believe that the South had to be punished. However, The Radicals believed in the ultimate punishment of the Southern states. The Conservatives exhibited greater leniency and were open to forgiving Southern states if they met specific requirements like abolishing slavery, accepting the 13th 14th and 15th amendments and etc.

Andrew Johnson, who identified as a Conservative, displayed limited enthusiasm for safeguarding the rights of newly emancipated individuals. On the other hand, Congress wanted to give blacks more rights and more power. In an attempt to advance these objectives, Congress pursued the Civil Rights Law, only to have it vetoed through a pocket veto by Andrew Johnson. This clash between Congress and Andrew Johnson caused some conflict as they had both very separate beliefs about the South. Johnson would veto legislation that was made by the congress. Johnson had a more lenient approach of reconstruction but the radical republicans wanted a more aggressive approach to rebuild the south.

Congress agreed to the terms of the 15th Amendment to maintain its political authority. The balance of power changed as the power shifted to the Republicans in 1867, as Congress established new governments in the Southern states, with the exception of Tennessee, which already had a predominantly anti-Johnson stance. This created five military districts in the Southern states, and each state was required to recognize the 14th Amendment and draft a new constitution. In 1869, Andrew Johnson faced impeachment due to his violation of rules and disbelief. This shift of power marked a substantial triumph for the Republican Party.

The reconstruction was complicated and while it was mainly both a political and social success it also had its downfalls. It gave blacks more rights and made more freer.

African Americans were now seen as more of an actual person than just some tool in society. It was more of a social success because even though it led to some social terrorist organizations like the kkk it abolished slavery and changed the mindset of most people. It changed their perspective of African Americans.

However, it was also a political success as it passed the amendments and unified the us. It did this by making all of the confederate states acknowledge the thirteenth, fourteenth, and fifteenth amendment and made them pledge their loyalty to the Us government.

Reconstruction was a mostly a success and unified the Us. Imagine if the reconstruction wouldn't have happened. We could still have had slaves in our society. Other ethnicities would be viewed as tools and not humans. We would also be not unified as one. The reconstruction was actually really important and affects us. But it still had some flaws like the formation of kkk and other stuff. But in the end it was mostly a social success and a political success. Reconstruction changed ours and fellow americans life for the better.




INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup old-fashioned rolled oats
- 1/2 cup peanut butter (or any nut or seed butter of your choice)
- 1/3 cup honey or maple syrup
- 1/2 cup ground flaxseed
- 1/2 cup chocolate chips or dried fruit (optional)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- A pinch of salt.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. In a large mixing bowl, combine the oats, peanut butter, honey, ground flaxseed, chocolate chips (or dried fruit), vanilla extract, and a pinch of salt.
2. Stir the mixture until all the ingredients are well combined.
3. Cover the bowl and refrigerate for about 20-30 minutes. This makes the mixture easier to handle.
4. After chilling, take small portions of the mixture and roll it into balls about 1 inch in diameter. You can adjust the size to your preference.
5. Place the energy balls on a parchment paper-lined tray or plate.
6. Put them in the refrigerator to firm up for another 20-30 minutes.
7. Once they've set, transfer the energy balls to an airtight container and keep them refrigerated until you're ready to enjoy. They can also be stored at room temperature for a day or two.


